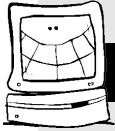

Few of us bought homes in Mount Royal to see it become a thoroughfare for our surrounding communities and an ever expanding Calgary to the south and southwest. It is true that some homes in Mount Royal face, and always have faced streets that are designated collector roadways for egress to other parts of the City. That is not to say that we as a community should sit back and accept increased traffic counts and speeding (both by transients and residents) as an uncontrollable inevitability – especially considering that the City planners are offering to protect us from the onslaught.

Although I have not heard the radio advertisement myself, I have been told that the developers of Garrison Woods to our southwest advertise that their community is a short commute from downtown "through the scenic neighborhood of Mount Royal". If only they would slow to below 90km to take in the scenery! Thankfully Jeff Holloway and his traffic committee have spent considerable time and energy in conceptualizing, working with the City, and in implementing a cohesive traffic plan for our community. I look forward to continuing to work closely with Jeff, with pockets of neighbors and individuals (the NIMBY folks) within Mount Royal regarding traffic.

The development of the beltline area and the Mount Royal side of 17th Avenue is sure to be a lightning rod for input and constructive criticism from members of our Community Association, as is the seemingly endless construction of new homes of varying architectural style, design and lot usage. Again, we should all be thankful that Michael Evans has agreed lend his insight and experience on our behalf in overseeing and coordinating Community Development.

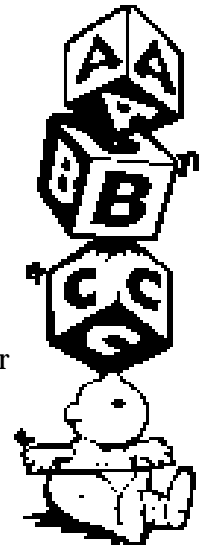

Traffic Safety Report

By the time you are reading this, you hopefully have become used to the trial traffic measures that have been installed so far in our neighborhood. The feedback that I have been receiving is quite positive with regards to the measures that have been installed. There is of course one common complaint – they are truly ugly as temporary measures. If you can envision a nicely landscaped park-like area similar to the other park areas in the community with several evergreens and other attractive landscaping, the measures become much more palatable. The diverter islands are required where there are pedestrians and to eliminate confusion, however, they may well end up simply being a raised area of a cobblestone type surface which can be driven on if absolutely necessary by residents to access driveways more easily.

The City, due to the repercussions of drivers slamming into the new temporary concrete measures, has gone hog wild on the signage. Once the measures are permanent, there will be a bare minimum of signage

The survey that was sent out to all residents stated that the temporary measures would be installed for ‘up to’ one year. If, as a community, we come to consensus regarding the traffic circles on Frontenac, the Talon Park extension and the Colburne measures, they can be designed and installed as permanent measures this spring. It is up to us – as a community – to make these decisions to proceed. The Premier Way circle unfortunately has to wait for the sewer project to happen.

The partial closures on 7th Street, Royal Ave, Hillcrest and Carleton could also happen this summer – once again – it is up to us as a community.

The new measure on 10th Street seems to be accomplishing what it is intended to do. I have noticed that Hummers and BMW 740's can go thru it Northbound at about 60-80 km/hr, but that is a different problem.

During the Mount Royal Children's Xmas Party a horse with blinders pulling a cart full of hay managed to figure out who has the right of way in a traffic circle, but just for additional clarification, the vehicles that are already in the circle have the right-of-way NO MATTER WHAT. It is the drivers that are entering the circle that need to yield to those already in the circle. If there are two people sitting at the yields waiting to come into the circle, it is – first come, first in. So if you are heading Northbound on 10th, you do not have the right-of-way!

There will be a meeting at Earl Grey School on Thursday January 29th from 7-9pm for people to come and discuss where we are at and where we go from here. Martin Haliday from the City will be presenting at the meeting and we will be trying to expedite discussion on all the traffic issues in the community and how we should move forward.

It is important to remember that Traffic is a very selfish issue for all of us – if you find yourself arguing against a measure that is potentially making you change your commuting or shopping route – please consider acquiescing to the residents that live in that area of the neighborhood – just as you may expect them to acquiesce to the needs of your area of the neighborhood. Our community is surrounded by major roadways and we have defined community collectors that should be used by all of us whenever possible.

Greetings from Alderman King

Hoping you all enjoyed a great festive season!

In October the City conducted a survey of citizens' perceptions. I was delighted to read that 96% agree that transit and bus services need to be extended. That's higher than the number supporting more interchanges (90%). At present the City's capital spending is more heavily weighted towards road construction, and there certainly still is a backlog of needed improvements. Focussing on the benefit of our inner city neighbourhoods, we need the interchanges built to persuade the commuters to stay away from our residential streets. And then we need to have a major focus on improving public transit, so more people will choose to make less use of their cars.

During Budget I was able to secure funding for a study of the underpass linking the Stampede with East Village. This is the first step to get this valuable local project approved.

Heritage buildings are also important to our older neighbourhoods. Many of you will remember the failed effort to save old St Mary's School in Mission. Recently it was my privilege to bring Council's greetings for the sod turning ceremony for the Catholic Board's replica building on that site that will become Our Lady of Lourdes School. We look forward to this phoenix rising from the ashes and becoming a new landmark.

During December the Glencoe stormsewer project will hopefully have taken a further step towards reality at the City's Utilities and Environment Committee. This multi-million dollar project is the first of three phases, all of which will bring benefits to stormwater management in Elbow Park, Mount Royal, Bankview and South Calgary.

The newly renovated Killarney Pool and Fitness Centre will have opened in December. With a representative of the community association, I had the pleasure of participating in the jury to select the art on the sides of the building, and hope it will be enjoyed for many years to come. This is the City's first such major pool renovation – so we're lucky to have it in our ward.

TRAFFIC CALMING IN MOUNT ROYAL
Now that we are all getting used to the new traffic measures, it is time to have an OPEN HOUSE, so your feedback can guide us as we move forward.

Most of the measures now in place seem to be popular with residents, judging by the calls and emails to my office, and the conversations around the neighbourhood. Now we need to confirm that they are contributing to improving the neighbourhood before they are made permanent. I'm hopeful they'll be planted and beautiful this spring!

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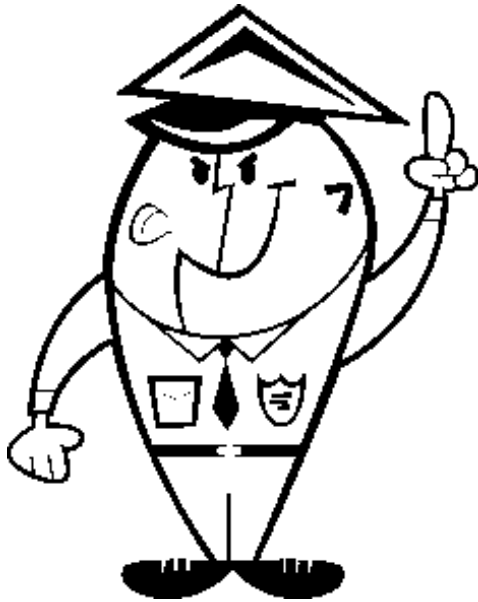

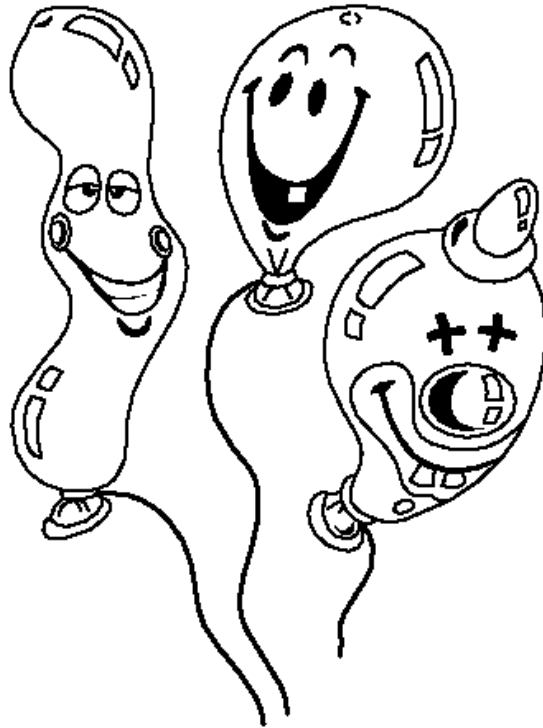

CALGARY HEALTH REGION ADDS BEDS TO COPE WITH INCREASING DEMAND

Calgary's health system continues to struggle with capacity and access issues. With the city's population increasing by more than 100,000 over the past five years, the Calgary Health Region's frontline staff has been hard pressed to keep up with the rising demand for services. Recently, the Region added 20 medical and pediatric hospital beds at a cost of \$500,000. The beds will serve as a contingency plan for coping with influenza season, which runs through April. Over and above flu season, the Region has been dealing with higher patient volumes. Between April 1 and Nov. 16, 2003, visits to the emergency departments at all four Calgary hospitals were up more than 10 per cent compared with the same period the previous year. In addition, the number of MRI scans being performed by the Region has increased 60 per cent in the past two years. But wait times for elective MRI scans have increased to nearly 200 days despite efforts by the Region to add new MRI machines. The Region will continue to take steps to decrease wait times for elective MRI scans. MRIs have become a valuable tool for physicians, who are now using the technology to help diagnose heart disease and bone and joint problems.

As a result of increased patient demand and lower than forecasted revenues, the Region has updated its anticipated operational budget deficit for the 2003/04 financial year to \$58 million. The Region previously projected that its deficit for the financial year ending on March 31, 2004 would be \$25 million after expenses of \$1.8 billion. The Region's expenditures are on target, but additional revenues expected from a new wave of initiatives discussed as part of the Mazankowski reforms will not be realized. We have been working closely with our provincial government partners and will continue to do so as we address increased service pressures and our

expected funding shortfall. We are doing everything we can to control costs in areas that do not affect patient care. The Region launched a review of administrative expenses in June. The committee conducting the review recently announced it has set a target for a 20 per cent reduction in administration expenses over the next three years. As a board, we are committed to good financial stewardship while recognizing the need to provide the public with first-rate health services.

With 3,000 surgeons in New York looking over his shoulder via a live broadcast from Calgary, Dr Randy Moore recently demonstrated a new technique for repairing an aortic dissection – the condition that claimed the life of actor John Ritter. Working with a multidisciplinary team of doctors and nurses at the Peter Lougheed Centre, Dr Moore completed the procedure to repair a tear in the wall of the patient's aorta in about one hour. The operation was broadcast to 3,000 endovascular surgeons attending the Veith Endovascular Symposium – the largest meeting of its kind held each year at Columbia University in New York. Since 1999, Dr Moore has been using what's called an endovascular stent graft to repair an aortic dissection. Very few surgeons use this technology, so the Calgary Health Region is considered a leader in this field. Patients can expect a two-to-three-week recovery with the

procedure, compared to the six-month recovery time with open-heart surgery, the previous treatment for an aortic dissection. Additionally, the surgery using this technology has a one per cent death rate and one per cent paralysis rate compared to a 20 per cent death rate and 40 per cent paralysis rate with open-heart surgery.

The Calgary Health Region is thankful to Country 105 FM and its listeners for supporting the Alberta Children's Hospital. The Country 105 Cares for Kids Radiothon in November raised \$605,000 for the Alberta Children's Hospital Foundation. The foundation provides funding for innovative family-centered programs, state of the art equipment, advanced medical training and internationally recognized pediatric research. During the Radiothon, dozens of children, families and caregivers captivated listeners with stories of hope, help and healing at the hospital. On November 7, country music star Paul Brandt

co-hosted the morning and afternoon drive shows and debuted his song Hope, which he dedicated to the hospital. Those wishing to support the hospital may purchase the song online from www.paulbrandt.com.

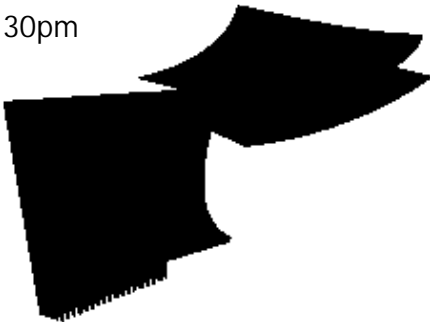
