President's Message

When it came time to assume the position of President of the Mount Royal Community Association I was flooded with contact from many of our neighbors, each of whom had the same message. None asked that I find a harmonious solution on the vagaries of "traffic calming." None asked to be protected from unchecked development of monster homes built to the very boundaries of good taste or from the creep of high-rise development southward across 17th Avenue. None asked that I act as ambassador to the rest of Calgary in representing the good people of Mount Royal. Without exception, the message was consistent: "You had better be as funny and as well written as that last guy." Alas, I confess that I am unable to fill Mr. Weyant's cruel shoes in this regard, and with the seriousness of issues before our Community Association as I write this missive I'm sure I will stray even further from the message delivered so loudly and so clearly.

The Mount Royal Community Association is a not-for-profit organization assembled for the benefit of the residents living within the well defined geographic boundaries of our community. It operates under a charter that defines its purpose, and is staffed by volunteers. The list of those who have given their time for the betterment of our community over the years is long and distinguished (a la "Top Gun"), and I think it is fair to say that each of those currently serving in some capacity on the Executive takes very seriously the

responsibility of representing our community and in doing our jobs well.

The following was written in response to a neighborhood resident who took time from a busy schedule to write to the MRCA in response to our membership drive:

"Dear [NEIGHBOR];

Thank you for taking time to write a thoughtful handwritten note in response to the Mount Royal Community Association membership drive. I am impressed that you took the time to make your feeling known to the MRCA Executive.

I understand that your decision to discontinue your membership in the MRCA is based on your impression that the Executive has allowed our community association to stray from a traditional role of coordinating social events into that of a "special purpose activist". As President I am particularly concerned about the image presented by the MRCA – not just within Mount Royal but also to our neighboring communities as being good citizens within the City of Calgary.

My own interpretation on the role of the community association was shaped (in part) by comments from an Alderman representing the deep south of Calgary who has been publicly critical of Mount Royal. While this particularly Alderman has opposed inner city traffic measures (specifically the redesign of Elbow Drive) he

endorsed the role of the MRCA in representing the collective perspective of our immediate neighbors. He views the community association as a fourth level of government (behind federal, provincial and municipal), where elected governors can turn for a grass roots opinion from individual neighborhoods. Under this view, we as a community association have a responsibility to answer the call from our Alderman to make known those issues that are of utmost importance to our particular neighbors within the riding. Your note expressing your opinion that we have become myopic in a proactive approach in this process has served as an important check as we work (as volunteers) in fulfilling this role – and will be shared with the Executive at our next meeting.

I decided to become actively involved in the MRCA to contribute toward the preservation of the quality of life that attracted us to Mount Royal. Certainly much of the enjoyment we derive from living in Mount Royal is social in nature (I consider myself much more a beer guzzler than politico!), but so too do we enjoy many physical characteristics that make our neighborhood an attractive, safe and desirable place to raise a family. We as the MRCA executive strive to strike a balance in satisfying a broad range of opinions, wants, and even agendas from a broad diversity of interests.

I respect the opinion you expressed, and hope you will accept my invitation to be my guest and enjoy a beer at our next MRCA sponsored neighborhood social."

There are several good points to be made here. The first is that the writer of the letter to the MRCA took the time to provide meaningful

feedback on how he felt represented (or not) by the MRCA Executive. Certainly we hear of those in the neighborhood who are in constant contact with other neighbors griping about this or that; those who chat at the Earl Grey School playground with opinions on MRCA initiatives; or generally those cannons who take a stand once every eleven years to sound off on the issues effecting the end of their driveway. All of these are difficult to respond to in a meaningful way.

The second point to be made came through continued correspondence with this resident who wondered if in fact the Mount Royal Community Association has the proper governance in providing feedback to our Alderman on the concerns of the neighborhood as a whole. The MRCA Executive is taking a hard look at our effectiveness in this role and increasing the means by which we move forward in responsibly representing the needs, wants and requirements of our neighbors enjoying the quality of life we do here in Mount Royal.

Toward that end, our website now has a section devoted entirely to feedback from community members on issues of importance to them titled "Have Your Say!" (www.mountroyalstation.com) This section is intended to provide a forum for opinions to be expressed in lieu of letters to the editor or sidebar conversation under the monkey bars. Do you have an opinion? Tell someone other than your immediate neighbor, and make your feelings known in a productive manner – as all postings will be taken quite seriously by the MRCA. We will also host a feedback session with neighbors at Mount Royal Station in the near future to ensure that issues of importance (other than traffic) are not being overlooked, and that we are responding as you think a community association should to the needs of the community as a whole.

In working toward enhancing good neighborly relations, nothing negates a Hatfield/McCoy feud like a "good old fashioned block party". Recognizing that it may be difficult for our

social chairperson Lori Russell to organize a series of these shindigs across the neighborhood this summer, we are encouraging YOU to take it upon yourself to get in touch with the MRCA to organize a street party. Our vision is that a neighbor on Earl Grey Crescent (and Sydenham, and Wolf Street, and Durham, and Colbourne, and Valois, etc) contact us to host a Saturday or Sunday afternoon barbeque, and we will help with the permitting and pay the first \$200 toward the party! The only thing we ask is that all of your neighbors (in Mount Royal, that is) are invited and encouraged to attend. Take the initiative and contact president@mountroyalstation.ca (or 616-1086) and get the ball rolling. We will advertise in the newsletter in advance of this series of summer/fall fiestas.

The MRCA has the opportunity to raise money for our community association by providing volunteers to work at a "Casino Night" Friday and Saturday nights, June 11th and 12th. Traffic Safety Report



OVERALL PLAN

The City has decided that it is time to get moving on their traffic calming plans for Mount Royal. It is important that we as residents remember that this whole process was started by the City and hopefully will one day be finished by the City. Our Alderman, working with the Traffic Department, divided the traffic plan into three phases that were to be completed over a three-year timeframe. It appears now that the process may extend longer than that due to the City being very busy. As your community representatives, the MRCA Traffic Committee has been trying very hard to keep the city focused on the project that they have started so that one day it may actually be finished. Unfortunately, the experience has been very similar to pushing an elephant using a rope – and we have not really had anyone pulling from the other end (or cleaning up behind the elephant which also keeps sitting down!).

This seems to have changed recently, as progress is being realized. The City has recognized that to fulfill their promises to complete Phase One this summer, they need to get moving quickly. The City is taking traffic counts and designing permanent measures so that we can all review and have input into the design of the permanent measures and hopefully get rid of the ugly concrete one way or another. It appears that we may see the concrete disappear in August – which will be exactly one year and on schedule – if it comes about as planned.

COLBORNE MEASURES

The MRCA and representatives of the City had a very productive meeting with interested residents in March to discuss the Colborne measures. We are hoping that the actions that the residents requested at that meeting will be drawn up by the City and presented to the community as a whole. In general the residents agreed to remove the straight thru restriction on Colborne and add some speed bumps and islands. The residents that attended the meeting were almost unanimous in their request that Colborne have the same treatment as Prospect does as it meets 14th Street, with a northbound only lane and inbound restriction implemented. The concept of another partial closure is unlikely to get very far considering the difficulty in implementing other closures around Mount Royal.

YOUR STREET – MY STREET

Everyone wants less traffic on their street but they also want their normal routes left alone. You can see that this NIMBY approach to the problem will not lead us very quickly to a solution. Please consider the community as a whole when making up your minds on these difficult issues.

PHASE TWO AND THREE

There are many items that remain to be resolved in Phase Two and Phase Three of the Mount Royal Traffic Plan. The schedule that the City has presented does not have these items considered until the fall of this year. The City will be holding an open house at Earl Grey School in early May – this would be a good time to discuss this with the city representatives and the Alderman.

17TH AVE PARKING

The Inner city Traffic Study has designated 17th Avenue as the only Major Road running East-West between the Bow River and Glenmore Trail. It also dictates that Major Roads are not supposed to have on-street parking. This predicament could be solved by the City using some of the money that they have been collecting from the businesses for many years to invest in several off street parking areas. We have contacted Alderman King on this issue however she does not believe it would be right to seek to remove the street parking. If you feel that this is a problem that should be addressed, please contact the Alderman and let her know your thoughts.

THE SEWER PROJECT

The sewer renovation project, primarily effecting Elbow Park, will start this summer. 8th Street and Premier Way will both be closed down for at least a month in the late summer. The good news is that the construction of a bike path down Premier Way that goes along with that project appears to be going ahead as well.

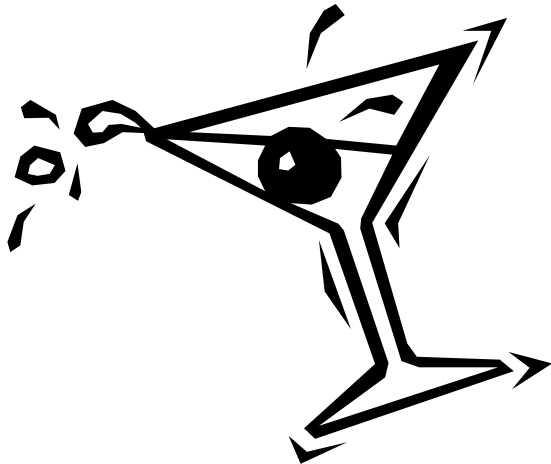

of a bonny bouncing miss!

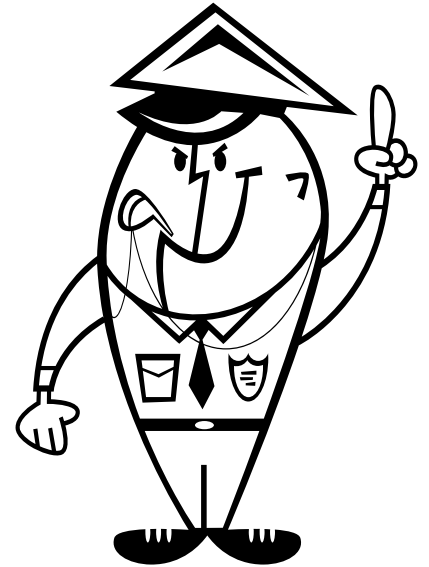

Greetings from Alderman King

Why does the City want more money from other orders of government? Over the past decade cities have picked up the cost of more and more services. And that means an increasing reliance on property taxes and an inability to build the sort of city many of us want to see.

Some examples are a ring road around Calgary including a road on the west side (Reserve land, Weaselhead or wherever) and a public transit system serving the needs of a city of a million. Policing has fallen more and more on the City's shoulders, and with a lack of funding, many areas particularly in the inner city, don't have enough officers on the street. Without police presence we see a growing incidence of drinking, drug dealing and other street crime, which spoil our quality of life and economic opportunities. Homelessness is a growing problem

with numbers rising dramatically; again, the City is doing what it can, but property taxes were never meant to deal with major social and infrastructure issues like this.

On water quality we need a regional plan and adequate resources to ensure our watershed remains safe.

And what of Emergency Medical Services being transferred to the Health Region? It's excellent news since it should operate as an extension of healthcare. *But what if the standard offered under the new scheme is "basic life support" as contrasted with the "advanced life support" Calgarians are accustomed to; will there be an expectation that our property taxes pay for that improved standard?* Income taxes and other taxes available only to the other orders of government are much fairer ways to pay for these things.

These are just some of questions about how the expectations of Calgarians can be met, and why the City wants more money from the other orders of government.

OUTSIDE EXPERT TO INVESTIGATE MEDICAL ERRORS

Calgary Health Region staff feel a deep sense of loss after a recent medical error led to the deaths of two patients. On behalf of the Region's board, I continue to offer our heartfelt apologies to the families involved. It is hard to understand, in this day and age of automation and safety checks, how accidents like this can happen. Sadly they do. After the error was discovered, we moved immediately to ensure the safety of potassium chloride in our Central Pharmacy. But there is more we can do. That is why I have asked a distinguished member of the Canadian medical community, Dr Rob Robson, Director of Patient Safety from the Winnipeg Regional Health Authority, to help us with an external perspective as we review patient safety procedures in the Region. His comprehensive review will look at the operation of our Central Pharmacy, examining how medications are prepared and distributed through the system. We are committed to be open about this review. If we can provide any solace to the families involved, it has to be our actions, not our words. It has to be learning from this mistake. It has to be our commitment to do better.

REGION TAKES ACTION TO ADDRESS STAFF SURVEY

A survey of Calgary Health Region employees shows most health-care workers believe staff errors often go unreported. We are taking steps to deal with these concerns by working with staff to identify opportunities to improve patient safety processes. The survey was sent to 6,800 staff, physicians, and senior leaders in September 2003 and was released to the public in March 2004. It examined three main areas of the patient safety culture in the Region, with the intent of creating a more systematic method of dealing with these concerns. There is a belief among 69 per cent of those surveyed that errors are not reported. Studies show only 10 per cent of all medical errors in hospitals around the world are

reported. There is a culture where people do not report all errors. More needs to be done to change this culture to improve patient safety. The Region needs to recognize the importance of reporting medical errors and being accountable. We owe it to our staff and to our patients. I will report on further initiatives at a later date.

PROVINCE INJECTS FUNDS INTO CALGARY HEALTH REGION

We are pleased health care was a top priority in the provincial budget released March 24. Alberta Health and Wellness funding to the Calgary Health Region will increase by \$134.5 million, taking the Region's 2004-05 budget to \$2 billion. The Region will continue to work with the province to solve current and future funding

challenges. The province took another step in the right direction March 29 when it granted \$82 million to address pressing acute care needs in the Region as part of its 2004-07 capital plan, including a \$70-million major development project at the Foothills Medical Centre. This project will see both the Intensive Care Unit and Emergency Department at Foothills upgraded and expanded. \$12 million will be used to purchase additional land and begin design and planning for other infrastructure projects and the new south hospital. We welcome the additional dollars from the provincial government and we thank them for recognizing our need for funding.

REGION WELCOMES NEW BOARD MEMBER

I am pleased to welcome Myron Kanik to the Calgary Health Region's board. Health and Wellness Minister Gary Mar announced the appointment in March. Myron's appointment will assist the Region in its efforts to work with the Alberta government to develop additional hospital capacity in the city. Myron's skills will be very much appreciated. His credibility with the decision-makers in Edmonton and his ability to convey financial information in a meaningful way will help in our ongoing discussions with government on the Region's capital requirements. Myron has had a distinguished career in the energy industry, in government and in community service. He is a member of the AltaGas Board of Directors and has served as Deputy Minister of Energy for the Alberta government. He has also served on numerous boards and agencies in the private and public sector, including the Canadian Energy Research Institute, the United Way Campaign of Calgary, the Calgary Homeless Foundation and the fundraising board of Mount Royal College.

News From Your MLA

There is always so much going on in Calgary Currie, and in the Provincial Legislature, that I often don't know where to start in telling people about it all. Our office is getting busier and busier all the time!

Here are some highlights that may be of interest to you.

Community Facility Enhancement Grants (CFEP), and Community Initiative Program (CIP) grants, now total nearly one million dollars in Calgary Currie alone in my three years here. These excellent Provincial programs provide funding for worthwhile community initiatives, community facility upgrades, and so on. Along with these two programs, there are several others that can provide funding towards worthwhile, not-for-profit community initiatives, and it doesn't cost anything to apply. If you have any worthwhile projects to propose or have underway, please phone and let me know about it – we may be able to help you to get your application in!

Legislatively, I am pleased to report that my Whistleblower Reward proposal, is receiving some national attention (thanks to those Ottawa scandals!) I am the first in Canada, to propose this powerful and effective new way to tackle fraud, and I believe it could save taxpayers billions eventually. Also, my Earned Income Tax Credit proposal, which is an alternative approach to raising minimum wages, has also been getting some attention as well. The EITC approach has been credited with lifting "millions" of people out of poverty, in other jurisdictions – and I believe I am the first in Canada to propose this as well.

My secondary-suite committee, had an excellent public meeting at South Calgary Community Centre recently, and has been receiving extremely positive reviews right across the Province. I believe we will ultimately be successful in significantly improving living conditions for thousands of people living in basement suites, as a result of this committees work.

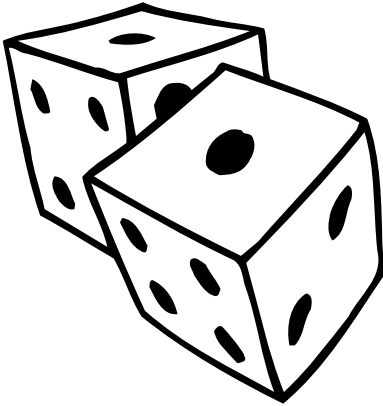

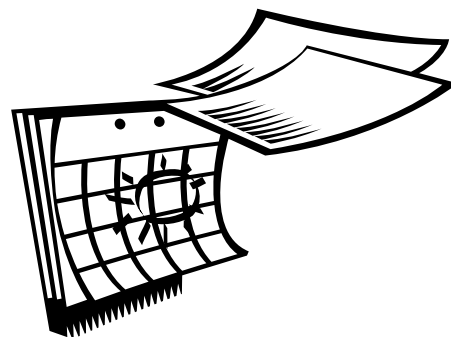
