Traffic Safety Report



Winter has drawn to a close, so what do we have to expect this spring and summer?

The sewer project on Premier Way that was started in the fall is yet to be finished. As you read this the City has started to finish the project – they want to get it done before the June rain storms start. They have installed a super-sized catch basin at the corner of Premier Way and 8th Street – the City has to change the roadway so that all the water that comes down Premier Way during heavy rainfalls will actually flow into the new catch basin. This will be a big job and will likely require the closing of Premier and 8th Street for short periods while they do the work. The benefit of this project to Mount Royal is that the City will finally be installing a wonderful, much needed, off-road multi-use bike/pedestrian path running from 10th Street down to 7th Street. As part of the sewer project, the portion of the path from Marquette eastward will be installed.

They will also be replacing those ugly crumbling concrete medians with much more attractive medians. There is a drawing of what is being installed on our web page at www.mountroyalstation.ca.

The City is also working on the final design drawings for the permanent traffic circles which are to be installed in both Mount Royal and Elbow Park. The latest of these drawings are always available on the website.

The City is in the process of preparing a modified design for the Colborne Crescent/11th Street intersection in order to address the comments raised in an independent safety audit of the intersection. Due to the fact that this new design will be significantly different than the current trial, the City will be implementing a trial of the modified design for the remainder of 2005 in order to assess its effectiveness.

With respect to the beautification of these measures, we would appreciate your input. This is what has been considered thus far:

- For the diverter islands around the traffic circles, a low-hedge plant, like Cotoneaster; it is just about indestructible, it is attractive, needs little watering and little maintenance. This hedge will be kept quite low, maybe 24-30 inches maximum so that it does not obstruct the vision of drivers. Many are quite excited about the prospect of how these would look, and also blend in, since there are many cotoneaster hedges in our community.
- For the larger circle areas, similar landscaping as already exists in the green areas of Mount Royal.

There has been concern expressed about the Community Association being responsible for the maintenance of the landscaping on these traffic circle areas. The City has made it clear that the landscaping maintenance responsibilities are

dependent on how these measures are landscaped which is why the City has been very non-committal with respect to the costs involved. If the measures are landscaped in the same manner as other similar green areas in Calgary, there should be no cost to the Community Association. The costs that the Community Association will have to carry are based on the enhancements that have been requested over and above what is considered normal throughout the City. This is viewed by your Community Association Executive as being reasonable. At present, the City Parks Department will maintain the hedge areas but this could change if the Community Association decides to request that other specialized features be added as enhancements.

The Talon Park extension could use an additional park bench. If you are interested in dedicating a bench, please let us know.

There has been concern expressed to the Community Association and the City about construction traffic and the new parkade that is part of the Tonko development at the corner of 7th Street and 17th Avenue. The development approval group within City administration has handed responsibility for requesting a traffic flow study onto the Roads Department, while the Roads Department has assumed it to be under the jurisdiction of the development approval group in the City. The Community Association is pushing the City departments to address the issue.

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Greetings from Alderman King

Community safety is a major priority for me as your representative on City Council. As such, I was delighted to be nominated to serve on the Calgary Police Commission (CPC) for the next 2 years. The CPC is composed of representatives from City Council and the public, and was established to take responsibility for the maintenance of an effective municipal police service.

The Commission plays an important role in the oversight of the Police Service, as it is a civilian body that recruits the Police Chief, establishes policing policy, reviews the Police budget, and reviews complaints against the Police Service. I also participate in the Complaints Oversight Committee, which is currently initiating a review of the complaints process to ensure that the public's concerns are efficiently addressed. The primary role of a Commissioner is to bring the CPC the public's concerns. As an Alderman and through my experience in both the prosecution and defense of criminal cases as a lawyer, I hope to bring a balanced perspective to the review of the complaints process. It is extremely important to provide a point of contact for the public, so that the Calgary Police Service can direct their resources to provide the most effective service to the City and be held accountable to the people of Calgary.

Community safety involves many aspects of city governance, and traffic safety is another area key to making our inner city neighbourhoods great places to live for all members of the

community. The City is in the process of reviewing its practices with respect to pedestrian safety in school and playground zones as the Province has published new guidelines governing these areas:

City Administration will be bringing a report on the local impact of these guidelines to the 2005 May 18 meeting of the Standing Policy Committee on Land Use, Planning and Transportation, which the public is welcome to attend. CALGARIANS CARE ABOUT THE ENVIRONMENT...

Thank you to everyone who attended our Town Hall meeting with guest speaker Bob Mills, Official Opposition Critic for the Environment.

It was encouraging to see so many Calgary Centre constituents gathered to discuss Canada's environment and provide their feedback and ideas regarding the Kyoto Protocol, treatment of garbage and sewage and the need to protect our air, land and water.

With respect to Kyoto, our guest speaker echoed the concern of many in the room that we need to invest in real environmental solutions instead of, for example, sending billions of dollars overseas to purchase Greenhouse gas emission credits from other countries, such as Russia.

The response was very positive to Mr Mills' detailed proposals encouraging the use of incentives to assist Canadian citizens and businesses in utilizing existing green projects and in developing alternative energy and transitional fuel technologies. The Conservative Party adopted Mr Mills' proposals at their recent policy convention in Montreal.

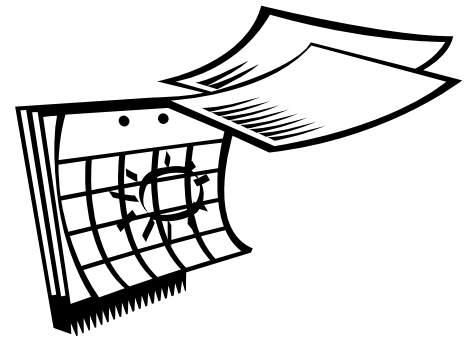
